Being pregnant has limited my ability to go into the field to build and interact with teams and families, which I have really missed. But at least I got to go celebrate our friend Josh's 200th build in Juárez last month. Within the last year or so Casas has been going through a transition to allow us to better serve the communities in which

we work. During this process we went from having a task based system to a location based system. Therefore, when we returned I entered the Juárez Field Department. During the cartel wars our ministry lost a lot of teams due to fear of the violence. This created an extended period time of patch work trying to keep everything together on such a tight budget. Now that the violence has ceased, we are in a postion to begin repairing and beautifying our properties, vehichles, and resources. In addition to fixing our current resources we are also in a position to finally begin a much needed building campain here at our headquarters. This is exceptionally exciting for me as it appears I will get to be involved in the deisign and construction of this project. The first step is a new warehouse, office, and shop for the Juárez field department. It's been so gratifing getting to use my gifts and talents to help bless families in Juárez in such a huge way.

By all accounts we should have been happy there, and to some extent we were happy. However, at our core, something felt off. After being back at CpC just a few weeks, that uneasy feeling is gone. I believe more than ever that

all of our dissatisfaction was rooted in events that began way back in high school and college when Roberta and I came on our first mission trips with CpC. It was at that moment something got planted deep within our hearts. It was that seed that lead us to do internships, and it was those internships that changed us at our core. It ruined us in the best way possible. It broke our hearts for people living in extreme poverty with no hope of breaking free of its death grip. More than just breaking our hearts for these people, it also allowed us an avenue to make a difference. While we deeply miss all our family and friends from back home, it feels so right to be here. 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
