I was so thankful for some relief from the heat for my baby girl. And Violet was much more comfortable after that. The bath also seemed to forge a connection between us and the family. From then on we were comfortable sharing stories and getting to know each other.



Another memorable moment was during a build in Juárez, México this summer with the youth group from my home church, Parkview Christian Church in Mt. Carmel, Illinois. We were building a home for Josefina, the matriarch of a large family. I went inside the little cardboard and pallet shack that her family of thirteen had been calling home prior to our arrival. While I sat nursing Violet on the hard mattress that took up the entire house, I listened to Josefina's story, through sobs, of how her daughter lost a baby in February of this year due to an illness. The baby, Harmonia, was about Violet's age. I had only known Josefina for a few minutes, but Violet's presence made her feel comfortable enough to share her story with me. After receiving her home, Josefina was filled with hope for a better future for her family. I am so thankful to have Violet in our lives to help us minister to these families. We can't wait for her to experience more builds coming up this Christmas Break.


